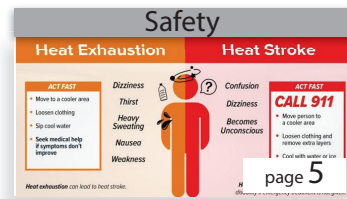
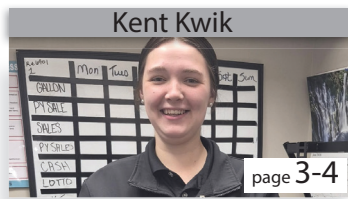

He went above and beyond to help this elderly Guest, and his actions serve as a wonderful example for all Team Members.



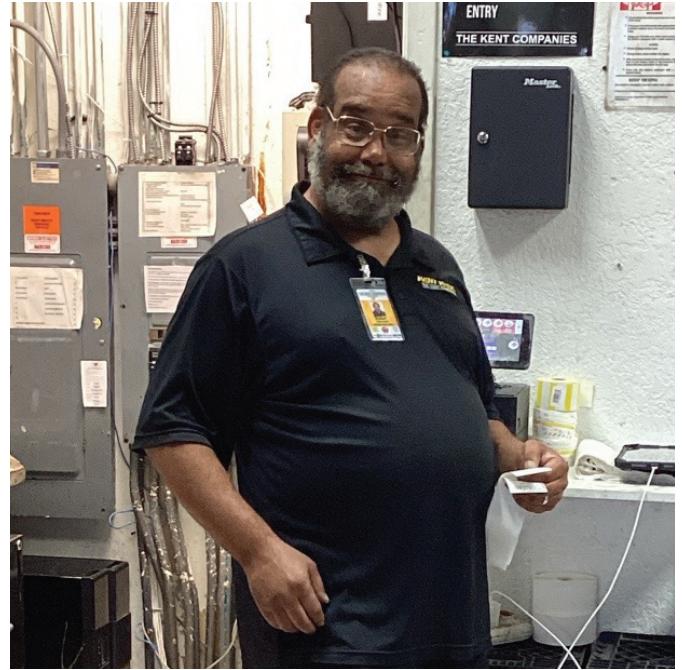

As I write this, the temperature in Midland is expected to reach **112 degrees today**. That is not just hot—that is dangerous. Last week, we talked about hydration and what your body is telling you (yes... even the color of your pee). This week let's focus on recognizing when a situation is becoming a serious emergency.

Heat-related illnesses happen when the body can no longer cool itself effectively in extreme temperatures. The warning signs of heat exhaustion often come first—dizziness, heavy sweating, thirst, nausea, and weakness. But when conditions escalate to **heat stroke**, it becomes life-threatening. Watch for confusion, disorientation, or someone becoming unconscious. These are critical red flags that require immediate action.

If you see these signs, act fast:

- Move the person to a cooler area
- Loosen clothing
- Begin cooling immediately
- Call 911

Hydration is your first line of defense, but awareness is what saves lives.

Stay cool. Stay hydrated. Stay informed.
